# **CURLING**COMES TO TOWN

As the heady days of dominating the lacrosse world that brought Bracebridge numerous Canadian and Ontario Championships faded away, another sport was quietly and successfully operating in the shadow of all the acclaim for lacrosse and cricket.

In Robert Boyer's invaluable book on Bracebridge, "A Good Town Grew Here", it is reported that a curling club was discussed in 1896 and came into being in 1898.

As in lacrosse, baseball and cricket, prominent people of the community were involved in its formative years. In 1896, F.S. Cochrane, Station Agent with the Northern Railway who, just 11 years earlier welcomed the first steam engine to Bracebridge, held a meeting at his office in the railway station with W.A. Gillespie, a merchant in downtown Bracebridge. There was enough interest in this new idea for them to go to work, and in 1898, a club was formed with an executive consisting of Angus McLeod as patron, Dr. Bridgland M.P.P. as President and an executive consisting of F.C. Meekins, Rev. M.J. Leith, F.P. Warne, H. B. Bridgland, J.H. Campbell, Peter Hutchison, and of course the two that could be considered the founders of curling in Muskoka, F.S. Cochrane and W.A. Gillespie.



There is a possibility they may have received guidance and support from curling organizations that emanated from the first curling club in Canada, formed in Montreal in 1807. There is nothing stated about whether they used "stones" made from steel, as they did in Montreal. No matter, the sport took root and has provided excellent winter entertainment for our communities ever since.

Mid-March saw the Muskoka Wild complete their inaugural season in the Canadian Premier Junior Hockey League (CPJHL), falling 4-3 in overtime to the Almonte Sharpshooters in the first CPJHL Presidents' Cup Final. In a fitting conclusion, the Wild trailed 3-0 after two periods before forcing overtime with 3 goals in the third. The comeback fell agonizingly short. The prospect of a long off-season loomed.

The Wild's march to the Final was dominant; their 35-7-3-3 regular season secured first overall in the CPJHL. The Wild easily dispatched the Seaforth Generals in a 2-game aggregate goal series. In the CPJHL 'Super 4', the Wild went 3-0 against the Grey Highland Hawks, Essa Stallions and Almonte to move onto the Finals. While the Championship game didn't end as hoped, the season was a resounding success.

Northern Athletic Education, Inc. (NAE) founded the Muskoka Wild to provide young players the opportunity to be part of a truly Canadian hockey experience; a supportive environment where management maintains a focus on skill development and character traits to maximize future success in life. Based in Port Carling, the tranquil surroundings and tight-knit community provided the backdrop for the experience many players dream of.

Though a season's end can create a sense of melancholy of what was, it can serve as a breeding ground for optimism. Doubt surrounding the viability of the Wild, and CPJHL, has been replaced by a collective confidence, supported by the league's united ownership group. NAE achieved most of its goals in its first year (a Championship loss was not part of the plan), and remains focused on delivering a truly Canadian junior hockey experience in its second year.










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## 8-ENDER IN BALA

**PRE-SEASON WARM-UP** – visit a practice facility. Give the clubs a swing there before teeing off or use the driving range option on a simulator to get the rust out and the lubrication into the swing joints used just for golf!


Everyone that showed up, showed up to play...as a team, as a family. There were no 'cuts', no house league team to draw from. Everyone made the team and they played like it all year.
