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


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#### CLUB RECEIVES GRANTS-OPENING IN JULY

The Muskoka Lawn Bowling Club is the delighted recipient of a \$25,000 grant from the Government of Canada's 'New Horizon for Seniors' program along with a Town of Bracebridge Community Grant for \$500.

The federal grant enables the new club to purchase senior-friendly equipment such as smaller, lighter bowls, lifters and pushers (like the stick used in curling) which will allow everyone to participate in this gentle sport along with other able-bodied bowlers. The grant allows for an 'Introduction to Lawn Bowling' program for older adults this summer. "Seniors are often confronted with a number of limitations, including health and social issues, when it comes to accessing quality recreational programming", states Sally Mills, MLBC President.

Partnering with Bracebridge's Recreation Department, the 'Introduction to Lawn Bowling' program, specifically for older adults, will run Monday/Wednesday, July 10/12, and again July 17/19 - 10am to noon. The program is \$60, which can be applied to the shortened-season 2017 membership fee of \$150 (regular adult membership next year will be \$250) which allows for unlimited play.

The town's grant will be used towards constructing an equipment shed for the new facility.

The lawn bowling club completed construction of its bowling green last fall. Mills explained that, "the new grass required time to become well-established to withstand the wear and tear of lawn bowling". Final touches are being completed on the area surrounding the green, including the equipment shed.

The Grand Opening of the new facility, located on the grounds of Muskoka Highlands Golf Links, on South Monck Drive in Bracebridge, is scheduled to take place on July 8th.

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T t didn't take long, after the inaugural meeting in 1898 that formed the first curling organization in Bracebridge, for things to get rolling. Although there is not much reference to the construction of the curling club building on Hunt's Hill (Taylor Road at Front Street), it apparently was in use in 1904 when enthusiasts George W. Ecclestone of Bracebridge and William F. Wasley of Gravenhurst got together and presented the Ecclestone-Wasley Cup for competition between the two Towns.

Obviously, curling quickly became popular in both areas. There is no reference to the location of the curling rink in Gravenhurst.

Artificial ice was unheard of at this early stage, and maintaining

proper natural ice for competition would have been difficult in the Taylor Road curling rink. One would wonder why the curling building wasn't built closer to the river to ensure a constant water supply for flooding. No reference is made as to how they got water up the hill for that purpose. It is doubtful that the town would have allowed the primitive water system, installed in 1894, to be tapped into for flooding so it remains that horse drawn sleighs carrying barrels of water might have been used.

To facilitate the forming of the ice surface, it is reported that, in 1906, there was a multi-purpose hardwood floor in the curling building that greatly aided in ice-making, although it did little to prevent the devastating warm weather in that same year from interfering dramatically with the curling season.

Everyone was patient with the wet start...and we still played some great games!







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
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#### 1st Kayak Polo Tourney– SHARKS TO NATIONALS

The first Muskoka Kayak Polo Tournament was held in the Huntsville pool. Huntsville 'A' beat Huntsville 'B', for the championship.



The Muskoka Paddle Club has acquired a 26-foot North Canoe for its recreational and competitive programs. Built by Michael Ruddock, formerly of Washago, it will be the workhorse in many of the 2nd year club's activities.

Commodore Charles Schofield says the 26-footer will be key in promoting healthy paddling for many of the groups ranging from seniors to those wanting to test their taste for competition. "In this year of Canada's Sesquicentennial Anniversary of Confederation, we will read about voyageur canoes as they make epic voyages on the traditional waterways formerly used as highways in early Canadian history", stated Schofield. The upcoming October Great Muskoka Paddling Experience event will feature North Canoe racing, exciting to participate in and watch.

Contrasting the smaller 1-2 person canoes, the North requires close co-ordination by the paddlers. It will be awkward to handle at the start, but when the paddlers click in perfect sync, the speed and grace provide "a terrific paddler's high", exclaimed Schofield. Members of the club will be able to paddle the canoe after an orientation session.



The Club will be hosting their first Youth Racing Kayak and Canoe Summer program for 8-18 year olds. The twice a week, weekday evenings (6:30 and 8:30), program will introduce kayaks, canoes and SUPs. The program will develop techniques and racing skills with qualified coaches while offering fun on-water activities during July and August.

The Muskoka Paddle Club welcomes new members seeking a healthy alternative to powered boating. Many clinics will be held to elevate members' skills to the next level. Weekly recreational paddling, evenings and daytime, explore the magnificent waterways of Muskoka. The club's collection of kayaks and canoes offers varied experiences for the members.

Schofield feels fortunate the club's programs are backed by a strong team of committed directors which is evidenced by a wide variety of activities.

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## Canadian Hall Of Fame Inductee

With happiness and pride, we announce the induction of Jim Lynch, long-time resident of Gravenhurst, into the Canadian Badminton Hall of Fame.

A book is required to enumerate Jim's accomplishments, to explain the significance of their importance, and dramatize his real-life circumstances.

The Hall's selection committee had difficulty deciding how to categorize Jim for entry. Of the three – Player, Builder (Coach/ Organizer) and Official – they chose Official. Jim's involvements were stellar in all three.

Jim umpired at the Regional, Provincial and National levels. Aware of the need to grow the sport, he trained aspiring umpires and spent twenty years as Chair/Member of the Canadian Badminton Officials Association.

As a National umpire, Jim worked International tournaments like the Commonwealth Games and World Championships. In 1983, at the World's in Denmark, Jim was selected to train as an International umpire.

Until 1996, Jim officiated many top International tournaments - highlighted by the '92 Barcelona and '96 Atlanta Olympics - where he umpired the Men's Singles Gold Medal Match.

Many would be satisfied to match what Jim had done in Officiating. But, that doesn't complete Jim's story.

Jim started as a player. In over 40 years of competition, he won over 300 titles. Among the most prestigious were 15 Ontario 'A' Provincial Titles, a Canadian Men's Doubles Championship and Gold Medals at the Canada Winter Games.

In 1972, as part of Canada's National Team, Jim had the unforgettable experience of participating in an exhibition tour through China playing against their National and Regional players. This Canadian contingent was the first country to tour China.

His wife Nancy (nee Vincent of Gravenhurst - the reason Gravenhurst is home) partnered with him on and off the court assuming many equal responsibilities.

For top level competition, they travelled extensively to Toronto. This was done as they followed successful education careers in Muskoka while raising a family. Son, Michael, resides in Markham, daughter Krista lives in Gravenhurst. Both are married with children who are involved in sport, and both coach/manage youth teams.

Jim's involvement extended to coaching. He and Nancy coached and managed teams/clubs from the local level in Gravenhurst (juniors and adults) to University (York and McMaster) to National (Canada Winter Games). As an NCCP Level 3 Coach, Jim also trained coaches throughout Canada and the U.S. at various levels.

Jim is deserving of this honour. The induction ceremony is July 28 at the Junior Pan-Am Games taking place at the Markham Pan-Am Centre, Unionville. For those wishing to attend, this is also the Finals of the Games - a memorable occasion in many ways.

From BTDC, Muskoka Dance Connection had numerous overall 1st place accomplishments - 'Welcome To The 60's', Intermediate Line; 'In The Mood For Trouble', Junior Large Group; 'Lemonade Stand', Junior Small Group; 'Newsies', Intermediate Large Group and 'Falling In Love', Over Senior Large Group.

Individually, Mamiko McEachran's Jazz Solo 'Chasing' performance earned 1st overall novice soloist at BTDC while Bernais' took 1st place soloist with 'Bennie And The Jets'.

In high school competition, Dhir (grade 9) and Shrey (grade 10) partnered and qualified for OFSAA after claiming the Georgian Bay Championship. There is no junior OFSAA. To qualify for OFSAA players must compete at the senior level (Grades 11-12). Their toughest competition at the GB level was the Huntsville team of Tyler Blair and Matthew Schmanda. At the MPS level these 2 teams met 3 times, each match going the full 3 games with Dhir and Shrey squeaking out the victory.

At OFSSA, Dhir and Shrey defeated a Toronto team in a tight 3-game match, lost their second match putting them in 'B' division. They advanced to the quarterfinals but lost their final match 23-21, 21-19. This was a very strong showing for these young competitors and forebodes well for next season.



This was a reminder to all that it's not always about medals. At this level, every second or hundredth of a second that a swimmer shaves off their personal best, is an accomplishment. Congrats to these 3 for their tremendous efforts at this meet!





#### **IN CONTROL** Shooting For Nationals?

e earned 2 silvers and a bronze. Took 4-plus minutes off his personal best in the 5k - that's huge - and apparently resembled a mountain goat going up a hill passing other racers. That was Nordic skiing...last year.

Now, he attempts the next step in...golf. He's the boss - Branden Boss, Muskoka's Special Olympics 'Athlete of the Year'.

Encouraged by Mom Jan, Branden joined the Special Olympics about 8 years ago. He played baseball and hockey but chose skiing and golf as all he has to do is focus on his own play and times. Having swung a club since he can remember, he started golf with the program 5 years ago.

With no formal teaching, no golf pro, he frequently hits 300+ yards at the range. He admits when the pressure's on, his drives dip to the 250-280 yard range. He's won the longest drive at the Hines Memorial Golf Tournament, a Special Olympics fundraiser, against able-bodied golfers.

Branden's preparing for provincials in July. In Special Olympics, the road to nationals is lengthy. Last year, Boss won regionals to qualify for provincials...nationals are next year. A Port Sydney resident, Branden primarily golfs at Huntsville Downs. He credits and appreciates their efforts with helping him get the golfing bug, especially after he eagled (2-under par) hole 17 there. "That was just luck", he said nonchalantly.

His attention now lies in the nuances of the game...when to lay up, which side of the fairway to play to get his best angle for the green - that it's not just 'whack it'. With continued guidance from Mom, he's thinking the game, but confesses he'd rather 'whack it'.

Not unlike most of us, he doesn't like practice and the organizational rules. "I just love getting out and playing. That's what I want to do", declares Boss.

Quietly unassuming, he feels his 'low-key' nature helps him maintain focus. He admits he internalizes perceived pressure - whether from others or himself.

He's the only Muskoka athlete going to provincials. It started with a 'natural ability', now it's fine-tuning. As the 24 year-old Special Olympian progresses, he maintains control.
