ROYAL HISTORY

Fiontar Mac Tire, a 6 year-old Connemara pony stallion, was part of royal history. Fion ("Fin"), owned by Janet Rowe of Muskoka Lakes Connemaras in Bracebridge, competed at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Toronto in the Pony Jumper Division. Fion was ridden by Nicole Donovan of Orillia. At the age of 16, Nicole is the first junior to ride a stallion in The Fair's 95 year history. Earlier this year, Equestrian Canada changed rules to allow riders 15-18 years to compete. Rowe turned to social media and found Nicole. Previously, with adults only allowed to ride, it was extremely difficult to get a rider for a pony.

Nicole and Fion competed in the 'A' level circuit in Ontario in hopes of qualifying for The Fair. The call came just a couple weeks before The Fair.

AN IDEA FROM ORILLIA?

In our Orillia magazine we just did a story on their new recreation facility which has recently (finally) started construction. The first concept of the new facility came back in 1977–yes, 1977–not a typo.

Here's what we thought was unique. They have began their Capital Campaign to raise funds. FIRE DEVASTATED CURLING CLUBS

The Bracebridge curling organization enjoyed 34 years of success in the curling rink they had constructed at the corner of Taylor Road and Front Street in 1899, and an occasional bonspiel at Dunn's Palace Rink. Following the devastating 1931 fire that destroyed Dunn's rink, George Yearly stepped into the picture and contracted to build a new skating arena that included a section with an ice surface consisting of two sheets solely for the use of the club. With the promise of this new facility, and recognizing the continuing deterioration of their 1899 building, in 1933 the club relocated to the new rink on James Street. The original Hunt's Hill Rink, in what had to be an emotional moment, was immediately demolished.

The club's tenure at the Yearley facility, however, was to be shortlived. Mr. Yearley quickly found out that operating his new rink was costly and he repeatedly appealed to the Town council for financial assistance. In 1937, the council capitulated and started providing some support, but in 1943 fire struck again and the building, which was heated by large wood stoves, was completely destroyed.

For a number of years, all ice-related activities had to make use of the facilities of other communities or temporarily cease to operate.

Following the end of World War II, when many young men were returning from duty with the armed services, a strong organization was formed and a new skating rink was created on the, then vacant, property of George Yearly at a cost of \$280,000. It was aptly named the Bracebridge Memorial Community Centre, which celebrated its official opening in 1949.

Erin Thorne is currently coaching at Wingate University in Charlotte, NC. Erin, a former assistant pro at South Muskoka, has led her team to a fourth place finish and a win at the Myrtle Beach Invitational at the team's first two events this year.

Erin formerly golfed at Western Michigan University, playing in every event the Broncos played from 2003-07. She turned pro in 2007, competing on the Duramed Futures Tour, the Suncoast Tour and the Canadian Women's Tour.

Brennan Webb, son of former South Muskoka pro Ron Webb, is head coach at Middle Tennessee State University. His team is moving up the rankings, as they have played to a fourth place, third place and a win at the Memphis Intercollegiate Tournament in their first three starts this season.







Brennan was formerly a fully exempt member on the PGA Web.com Tour in 2009, logging three top 25 finishes. In 2010, he competed in the Zurich Classic on the PGA Tour. He reached the second stage of the PGA Tour Qualifying School eight times in nine attempts.

John Handrigan moved this year from coaching at Florida to take on the head coaching position at Notre Dame University in Indiana. In their first four starts they have earned a sixth, fourth, third and a win at the Fighting Irish Classic.

John is just the seventh head coach in the 89 years of Irish men's golf, dating back to the fall of 1929.

All three continue to have close ties to Bracebridge and are supporters of the club's junior program.

There's only 28 in Ontario. You'd expect most of them to be in the GTA. However, the largest area that has this is Hamiltonpopulation 550,000. Many locations include Red Lake, Belle River, Pain Court - yes, towns in Ontario. Bracebridge has one too.

It's recognized around hockey here, but after that, who knew?

Bracebridge has the Hockey Canada Skills Academy (HCSA), operated via St. Dominic Catholic Secondary School (St. Dom's) here.

The HCSA was developed following the 1999 'Open Ice Summit' as one of 11 recommendations to improve 'Canadian hockey' development. At the time, many media reports stated the 'summit' was due to Canada's results at the '98 winter Olympics where the men's team failed to make the podium and the women lost to the US in the gold medal game. Also, in the late 90's, Europeans and Russians dominated the NHL draft and awards.

Coach Dan Blum, well-known in South Muskoka Minor Hockey, runs the HCSA program here. Even with his successes in minor hockey, Blum still had to qualify through Hockey Canada. It is also mandatory that he attends Hockey Canada courses/seminars to maintain program eligibility.

The St. Dom's students in this 'class' receive a credit. The skeptic questions why the student gets a credit for playing hockey as opposed to 'learning' something, say math.

"This isn't just hockey. We range from a junior player to a few that are new to the game. Sure, it teaches and enhances skill sets, but the academic side teaches nutrition, CPR, fitness, health. There's a written exam at the end", states Blum pointedly.

This group has 21 players - cap is 24. Brynn Kirbyson, grade 10, is in her 2nd year of the program. She loves the game and plays for



the Orillia Hawks, the girls association there. Brynn sees a chance to improve her skills, meet new people, all which may enable her to move forward in the game with a scholarship or another aspect. "This is a fantastic program. It's fun to learn everything on the ice and off. It's not an easy credit. The only thing missing, more girls" she says nudging her head towards the boys with a laugh.

Jake Kelly, who hasn't played minor hockey for 3 years, took the course. "I want an active lifestyle," was his response when we looked at him rather inquisitively. "We've got different levels of players. Coach Blum copes well with all of us. I mainly chose this because it also teaches nutrition, proper weight training and stuff. It's pretty good."

A few years ago, when St. Dom's applied for the program, the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board had 2 other schools participating. Blum, along with Principal Kevin Strong and VP Joe Conway, thought the program would be a good fit...promote activity, health, hockey and the school itself.

Although you have to be a St. Dom's student to participate in the HCSA, you're not required to be Catholic to enroll at the school despite popular belief.

Ice and class time are equally split. The academic side teaches elements that can be carried through and the balance is there. "We have time to do extra things that minor hockey coaches don't have the time to do. Skills will improve but the students still have to pass - and not just the puck", finishes Blum. **OT**



C oaching, a most rewarding experience, has its learning moments and I've had more of these than the average person. Often, the learning has happened due to my miscalculations, but not always. I wish to share some of the wisdom I have acquired.

Once, a player, a wonderful girl for whom I have a soft spot, asked me, "Coach, how can I become a starter?" I usually don't mind this question. I often give the "statistically speaking" answer but her stats were among the best. Truth is, she gets in her own way. How could I impart my thoughts to her without hurting her feelings? I told her, rather than improving statistically, GIVE more to the culture. Quoting John F. Kennedy, "Ask not what your country can do for you... ask what you can do for your country." I let her mull that over.

She came back asking if it was a unity thing. I was impressed, she grasped the concept. "Yes, it is." I clarified," 'Unity', or 'teamwork', comes from the willingness of the collective to give without being asked to share; learning to be selfless." I'm not sure she understood. I explained, until she finds it in herself to become a true team player, she'll likely never find that floor time she wants. Not sure if our chat helped, time will tell.

A coach friend of mine says frequently we've entered into the "Age of Entitlement." Ten minutes don't go by without me seeing some of my players on a phone, taking a "selfie" and posting it on social media. They use these methods every day to SHOW OFF in every aspect of their lives. In this "Age", have we lost the meaning of TEAMWORK? It's about ME now. It's a systemic issue - "What can you give me?", "How can I get what should be mine?", "I want more playing time", "I want to be a starter", etc. Where, in all this, do I hear, "Coach, what could I do to make our team better?" Words like that are rare. If your players don't have the 'give first' attitude, your team will never perform at their highest level.

Imagine a player saying, "I'll give more effort at practice and give my teammates positive encouragement. I'll shag that ball before I get my water. I'm going to be a leader in every aspect of my performance. I'll review my core values, adjust them to encourage a positive environment, then preserve that attitude and move it into game situation." This attitude would be wonderful if it were adopted by all members of your team, a coach's dream.

Parents often enable these "Age of Entitlement" behaviours. It's rare that I meet a parent who has the entire picture in mind. The parent of that girl came to me asking why I didn't play the best players all the time. Parents don't understand the difference between watching and coaching. Parents worry about one player, their child. I worry about eleven players, and their parents. If you think his comment was for the benefit of the TEAM, it was not. It proves my point. If this is what the parent was asking me in public, imagine what he'd be saying to his daughter at home. Parents should spend time understanding and talking about the big picture. These negative comments create animosity within a team, and do not lend themselves to developing a cohesive unit.

A few years ago, I was talking to a coach, for whom I have great deal of respect, he is a very successful high school and club coach, has won many championships, and has even produced a national team player. Mr. Bartlett said to me, "I'd rather lose with 12 players I like, than win with 10 I hate." I used these words as the back bone of my lifetime of coaching. I would rather lose with 12 players who understand the concept of 'team', than win with 10 who only function as individuals. I'll never forget those words. I'll continue to use them as part of my core values.

If we work together, parents to players to coaches, to put away the 'ME FIRST' attitude and commit to 'TEAM', only then will you truly be a TEAM PLAYER.
