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


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
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# FOUNDATION MARKS **SUCCESSFUL 2017**

We're pumped about it. Once complete, we'll become the definitive local sports hub.








# CURLING CLUB'S JAMES ST. HOME

Pollowing the devastating fire that destroyed the Yearly skating rink on James Street in Bracebridge, those involved in curling activities got their act together a lot quicker than the hockey and figure skating organizations.

With a great deal of volunteer labour they went to work quickly and were back in business in 1946 in their own building on James Street. They first operated with natural ice, converting to artificial ice provided by the new Memorial Community Centre once it was up and running across the street.

They made this location their home until 1973 when, after a hotly debated discussion of the Club, it was approved by a 96 to 8 vote to continue their operation in the new South Muskoka Curling and Golf Club. All existing assets were conveyed to a new, revitalized curling organization.

An interesting anecdote regarding the James Street building - prior to the relocation, during a routine governmental judiciary review of all publicly used buildings in Bracebridge, this writer conducted a government appointed engineer on an inspection of the structure.




Together we stepped inside and the engineer stopped and took a very quick glance at the interior, no doubt observing the long, tamarack poles that served as roof rafters, the inflammable panelling and the shifting cement blocks of the exterior walls, turned to me and said "Can we talk outside?" I knew what he meant.

In 1974, the Bracebridge Town Council purchased the property from the Curling Club for \$35,000 and in 1976 it was demolished to create a parking lot for the use of the public.

ntario Junior International 2018 meet was held recently at the Toronto Pan Am Sports Centre for the fourth consecutive year and for the first time ever, two MUSAC swimmers qualified for this elite event.


Samuel Kuntz, 18 and Ally Goldring, 15, each achieved qualifying times that entitled them to race against competitors from Great Britain, Japan, and USA, as well as top athletes from the Swim Canada National team and various provincial High Performance Centers across the country.

The impetus behind this meet was to bring more internationally experienced swimmers here to Canada in order to provide our swimmers with stronger competition in which they could gain more experience. And that's exactly what Sam and Ally did!

Only swimmers 18 and under were eligible for this event and each race was open to all ages, unlike other meets where swimmers typically compete against their own age group. This meant Ally was challenged by swimmers three years older in each of her five events over the course of the weekend. Her best result came in the 50m breaststroke where she placed 21st.

For Sam, making 'A' finals in both the 100m and 200m backstroke was a huge

experience even further.


Maggie is six years old and in our three hour precompetitive group.



**S** outh Muskoka's atoMc Green Bears are part of McDonald's atoMc Hockey / Équipe McDo program that sponsors 53,000 minor hockey players across Canada. The 2017-18 hockey season marks the seventh year of atoMc Hockey providing game jerseys and coaching materials to house league players in the atom division, and bantam division in Quebec.

This season the atoMc Green Bears won a random draw from the South Muskoka Minor Hockey Association for the chance to take part in the annual Bracebridge NHL alumni and OPP hockey game to support Special Olympics.

Former NHL players Brian Muir, a Stanley Cup champion with the Colorado Avalanche, Mike Krushelnyski, a three-time Stanley Cup champion as a player with the Edmonton Oilers, and Stanley Cup winner as an assistant coach with the Detroit Red Wings, and former Maple Leaf, Mark Laforest took part in the game.

The atoMc players escorted the NHL alumni onto the ice and stood with them during the introductions and national anthem. During the first intermission the team played a scrimmage against each other with the NHL alumni joining in.

"The players had a blast and got autographs from the alumni after the game," said South Muskoka Minor Hockey local league director and team trainer Mark Downey. "It was truly a special experience for the team, I'm sure the players will remember it forever."





While it is a national program, atoMc Hockey is a local sponsorship program at heart. McDonald's owner/operator Alan Cumber supports 12 teams in Parry Sound, Huntsville and Bracebridge.

"McDonald's has always strived to be a good neighbour and hockey is important in our

community so sponsoring these teams is a natural fit," said Cumber. "atoMc Hockey has supported more than 300,000 players in Canada and I'm proud to do my part in the Muskoka region."

One of three South Muskoka Minor Hockey Association atoMc Hockey teams, the atoMc Green Bears also receive support from HRC Insurance. The squad is undefeated so far this season, a record their trainer attributes to selfless play and teamwork.

"For the most part, the players attend different schools but hockey has brought them together and strong friendships have developed," said Downey. "The friendships have extended outside of the rink as our team parents organize post-game lunches and will also be coordinating downhill ski afternoons at Sir Sam's ski resort when the team travels to Haliburton for hockey."

The local league offers players the enjoyment of playing in different arenas both against kids they know, as well as teams from nearby towns so they can develop rivalries similar to the representative teams that their other friends may play on.

"McDonald's support of the atom division is critical because for most players this is the age when comprehension of the game gets stronger and they truly begin to love the sport," said Downey. "Others decide it's not for them, but they have learned hockey skills that will allow them to play the game for life. Also, the lowered cost for parents help more players get on the ice and the sense of pride the team members have with uniforms and socks unique to their team is special."


## CURLING EXPERTS VISIT BALA

## HORNETS SAY GOODBYE TO MORIMOTO

ast February I received an email from Logan McKnight, one of our starting pitchers for the Muskoka Hornets Midget Elite team. Logan indicated that a Japanese exchange student at school in Huntsville, Kiyohiro (Kiyo) Morimoto, played baseball and was interested in coming to our winter workouts.

I told Logan to bring Kiyo to work out with us. The following weekend, Kiyo showed up with his Made in Japan Mizuno pitcher's glove and decked out in a Nippon Ham Fighters t-shirt. He threw a bullpen for our coaching staff, a normal introduction for a pitcher to a new team.

It was evident this kid could play, he had flair. Kiyo signed with the Hornets shortly after this workout, and after receiving approval from his Japanese agent and local house parents, Bill and Liz Weber.

Kiyo arrived in Huntsville in December 2016 on a one year overseas school program to help Japanese students adapt to life away from home. In his program, Grade 11 students live away for one year and are only allowed to communicate with family via regular mail. Kiyo's first correspondence after joining the Hornets was to ask his mom to send the rest of his baseball gloves.

Kiyo fit right in with his Canadian teammates, learning to joke about cultural differences and to make fun of his baseball brothers in a polite, but quirky manner. One thing every teenager has in common is social media, and Kiyo often texted in the team's group chat about his activities in Huntsville, including a volunteer job posting at a local hair salon.

Under Kiyo's school program, he's not allowed to work locally and is not permitted to travel without his agent's approval. Despite this, Kiyo joined the Hornets local umpire crew for our annual Muskoka Cup tournaments. Kiyo's umping experience in Japan involved his own team's games. Players not involved in games in Japan are responsible for umpiring, significantly different from North American baseball.

While Kiyo did a fine job umpiring, the language barrier and the odd chirp from parents limited his interest in wearing blue for our tourneys.



Given the amount of travel for the Midget Hornets, which included two US trips, Kiyo's school activities sometimes overlapped with his Hornets duties, forcing him to decide which event to choose. Where possible, he chose baseball.

However, in one instance, he had no choice but to participate in a school function that overlapped with our first US tournament - his school's trip to visit universities in San Francisco and Toronto was mandatory.

Kiyo asked me to speak to his agent about bypassing his school trip. I was told there was absolutely no way he could attend this tourney. Somehow, Kiyo himself, convinced his agent to let him play, and off he went to Indiana with the rest of the Hornets, bunking with teammate Scott Adams for the 5-day tournament.

Looking back on the season for the U17 Elites, having Kiyo join our team was the highlight. He made everyone laugh constantly with his Japanese idiosyncrasies, lack of understanding local culture and his teammates' quirks. And, he did a great job as a starting pitcher. Combining discipline, focus and consistency, he logged over 41 innings with an ERA under 3.00.

Most importantly, Kiyo was (is) a great person. To say good-bye, we hosted a surprise party for him and gave him a game-worn Team Canada baseball jersey with his name and favourite number 11 on the back in honour of his favourite baseball player, and soon to be major-leaguer, Shohei Otani.

Unfortunately, Kiyo's path back to Japan will cross over with Otani's path to North America. However, no one in the Hornets program will be surprised if Kiyo is back atop the 10-inch bump at McCulley come summer 2018. We could only be so lucky to see him there.

On behalf of the entire Muskoka Hornets program Kiyo, we wish you best of luck (がんばろう).

ver many years at the studio and in competitions, she developed a passion for dance. Though never 'the star', and only periodically in the middle of the front row, her effort was unquestionable.

Madison Michel recently graduated from the concurrent education program (teacher) at Nipissing University, where she also joined the dance club.

She teaches a grade 5 class. Around the same age group as when she started dance.

Wemindji has some sports, hockey's the main one. Madison took a shot, started a dance club.

Not sure if it would be accepted by the kids, "I was hoping for 5 or 6, make a little routine," she said. About 40-45 showed up for the first couple weeks. That's declined a bit - dance isn't for everyone - to typically 25-30 ranging from about 5 years old to 16.

Madison enrolled the help of Kelly, fellow 1st-year teacher and neighbour. Kelly has some dance experience and helps keep things in order.

As the kids began learning moves, mainly tap dance, Madison would try to explain how tap shoes made 'clicking' noises when performing the moves. It's difficult to explain, 'this is what it would sound like...' or 'this move would be easier if we had dance shoes'. The light came on.

An email was sent to Tammy and Meagan at Muskoka Dance Connection, Madison's former studio here in Bracebridge.

"I thought if Emily, Kristyn (Meagan's daughters) or Mary(Tammy's daughter) had some shoes hanging around, maybe I could get a few pairs. The kids could share them, like what they do with hockey equipment, then they could get an idea of the sounds and movement," said Madison of the original intent of the email.

From there, Muskoka Dance Connection ran with it. "We thought it was a great idea," Tammy said. "Our Madison's wanting to teach her kids up there dance. We're excited for her, and we wanted to help the kids."

"We emailed our parents about what Madison was doing and asked if they had some shoes hanging around that weren't being used anymore," stated Meagan.

Shoes started coming in.

Then another email - the 'big one'.

Every year the studio promotes a 'shoe exchange', similar to that of ski, hockey exchanges - where one can purchase previously used items. There was a large number of shoes in the studio.

"We asked parents to either pick up the old shoes, or donate them," said Tammy. "We said what Madison was doing and all we got back was donate, donate, donate. It was amazing."

Meagan and Tammy topped it off. They added a bunch of costumes. Madison was not aware of what was going on.

The studio emailed Madison before she came home for the holidays saying they had a few things.

They met at the studio. Then a multitude of boxes and an old, big, overflowing laundry basket came out. There were easily 50-plus pairs of shoes - ballet, hip-hop, tap - plus close to 50 costumes, with gloves, 'jewellery' and the like.

"This is amazing", Madison said with a huge smile. Virtually in a state of amazement she expressed, "My kids are going to love this. Thank you so much."

Madison added her appreciation for the efforts put forth by Muskoka Dance Connection and is grateful to the parents and students at the studio. "I can't even begin to tell you how much this will mean."

Once the package is shipped, Madison plans to open the box with the kids at their first gathering. "They are going to be excited, I know that."

An enjoyable activity that started over a decade ago developed into a passion. Now, it's Madison's turn to give it back. The dance continues... in Wemindji, Quebec.






