




Ken Veitch Jr. and Norm Raynor Player category; Tim McBride, Coach/Official are the 3 new inductees to the Bracebridge Baseball Wall of Fame for their contributions or achievements in the sport in Bracebridge.

'Community Coach of the Year' will be presented to Mike Fry who helped guide the Bracebridge Bandits Squirts to an undefeated season to capture the Ontario Amateur Softball Association's Championship.

THE FIRST BRACEBRIDGE SKI CLUB

The 3 men from Cobalt that skied through Bracebridge in 1931 on one long set of cross-country skis fitted with three sets of harnesses (picture that), on their way to Toronto, sparked interest with people in Bracebridge.

That event may have given birth to recreational skiing in Bracebridge. Many in Bracebridge started skiing every weekend and, in 1933, the Bracebridge Ski Club was organized with 48 members, William Creswick as President.

This caught the attention of those in authority. In 1934, Bracebridge Road Superintendent, David Hockridge, was directed by Council to create ski facilities with 2 jump ramps, a slalom and downhill run and

> 3 bobsled runs in the steep valley on the Gibbs farm north of town, west of the Bracebridge Cemetery.

In 1935, club membership climbed to 109. Competitions were held in slalom, downhill and jumping. The executive consisted of President Dr. Fraser Greig, VP Mrs. Cowan, Secretary G. Leslie Tennant and Treasurer Mrs. MacMillan. In 1938, Judge Mahaffey became President and W. G. Gerhart, Secretary-Treasurer.

he Bracebridge Breaker's Under 13 Girls basketball team has come a long way. This season, the team went all the way to the Ontario Basketball Association (OBA) 2018 Ontario Cup and came away with the gold medal.

Provincial The Ontario Championships is the season finale, with clubs from all over the province competing. It is the culmination of effort, commitment and development made by teams throughout the basketball season.

This year, the Under 13 Girls tournament was held in Niagara Falls. Rankings for the tournament were based on games played during the season and the Bracebridge Breakers were placed in Division 9.

On day one of the tournament, the Breakers started off strong in their match against the Milton Stags with a 32-24 win. The momentum continued on day two with convincing wins against the Canadian

Basketball Academy (40-26) and the Stratford Optimists Basketball Club (28-15).



With no losses in pool play, the Bracebridge Breakers went directly to the Gold Medal Game against Orillia Lakers. These two teams played regularly during the season and were evenly matched.

The game started off close and the Breakers were only ahead by a basket (14-12) at the half. The girls played strong defense in the third and fourth quarters which lead the team to a 26-16 victory.

The Bracebridge Breakers Basketball Club has proven itself to be a positive part of the community. In recent years, the program has grown from two teams in 2012-13 to seven club teams and offer additional youth programs such as Steve Nash Youth Basketball and the Junior NBA.

Basketball in Bracebridge has come a long way.

In Boys U19, Shrey and Dhir Patel proved to be the best, finishing one-two in Singles with Dhir coming out on top. They partnered in Doubles and won all their games on route to the Gold Medal.



Players now turn their attention to their school teams where several Falcons have made their mark already. Shrey is the MPS Senior Boys Singles Champion. Morgan, with Ashley Smith of Bracebridge, are MPS Junior Mixed Doubles Champions. Morgan and Shrey just competed at GB's, then Shrey hopes to move on to OFSAA.



TO TURF OR NOT TO TURF - PART I

Topic: the rec facility eventually coming to Bracebridge. The arena and library are what they are. We're wondering about the 'indoor rec facility,' fieldhouse' or glorified gym concept.

Present plan: the floor is to be 'rubberized' and, theoretically, can house basketball, pickleball, badminton - which require various 'nets'.

The schools and Sportsplex already have these floors and nets, just not 'rubberized'.

We contacted the school boards. The Catholic board office (for St. Dom's & MMO) spoke to us. TLDSB never returned calls. We presented this scenario:

We operate a minor, youth sports group with volunteer coaches. What's the cost to book your gym one night a week for 20 weeks? Answer: \$160.00 (+hst) - broken down: \$60 one-time 'permit fee' plus \$5.00 per rental 'security check'. Gym's ours from 7p-10p. Average, \$2.67 per hour (discounts/subsidies applied) including potential access to their equipment.

The Town's website lists a 'half hall, community service, recurring rental' rate at the Sportsplex at \$18/hour. Arena, dry pad (no ice), 'community service' rate, \$38/hour.

We'll make this (knowingly incorrect) assumption for demonstration purposes.

Say the new facility splits the difference above and charges \$28/hour. We'll take off 50% for subsidized groups. Rental rate using school example above, \$840 (\$14/hrx3hrx20nights).



A 525% increase...and, we're guessing we're very low in what will be charged for the new facility.


A 'turfed' surface is different. One can create a market/demand for it. Get new sports - touch football, ultimate frisbee, soccer league, winter baseball/ soccer practice...things you cannot do properly on a wood or 'rubberized' floor. Groups from Huntsville, Orillia, etc may use our 'turfed' floor. That's economic spin-off.

We wrote about this first in March '17 - visit issuu.com/overtimesportsmagazine (pg 4 titled "\$47.5 Million - Quick Thoughts").

We'll continue this topic next month.

"Sally Mills, President of the Muskoka Lawn Bowling Club, is a role model for the expansion of the great sport of lawn bowls," said Phillip


