Winter's almost over and some activities, like hockey, are coming to a close. Other organizations are in registration for spring/summer activities.

While there's a lull in applications in February; March and April get busy. "CHAMPIONS OF THE WORLD"

The winning lacrosse teams from Bracebridge in the early years of the 1900s set the stage for a string of championships that lasted until the outbreak of World War 1 in 1914.

Canadian Junior Championships came to Bracebridge in 1908 and 1909, according to William Bastedo Sr., a member of the winning 1906 team. Many of those junior aged players moved on to bring Intermediate Championships to Bracebridge in 1912, '13 and '19, reflective of the fact many players had enlisted with the armed forces during the war years.

To win the 1908 Championship series, Bracebridge defeated All Saints of Toronto 7 to 4 and Brantford 9 to 6 in the final. They repeated the feat again in 1909 by defeating Fergus Thistles 15 to 4.

That 1909 Championship series must have been a classic. A train load of fans from Bracebridge, complete with the local brass band, travelled to Scarborough for the tournament format playoff. Stores and offices were closed, holidays declared, leaving Bracebridge looking like a ghost town. Not to be out-done, Fergus fans also arrived in great numbers. Being heavily settled with Scottish immigrants, many were

decked out in kilts and led by a furiously wailing piper. However, Bracebridge dominated from the start and, by halftime, the piper

had grown silent and crept out of sight behind the press stand, lamenting "It's no use. They're dead ones", according to coverage of the game by the Toronto Evening Telegram in a lengthy article.

The Bracebridge newspaper, following the victory, blared headlines "Junior Lacrosse Team Champions of the World".

SKI CLUB HOSTED CANADA'S OLDEST CLASSIC LOPPET

Arrowhead Nordic Ski Club continued their annual tradition of hosting the 'Muskoka Loppet' in late January. The Loppet was started in the late 70's by local hoteliers and restaurateurs to bring skiers from across North America to Huntsville during the tourist 'off-season' to compete in a distance skiing event as part of the World Loppet series. This event brought 1000-1500 people to Huntsville annually from around the world.

'Loppet' stems from the Norwegian word løpet, a long distance cross country skiing event greater than 35 kilometers. Participants include competitive skiers who enjoy skiing at their own pace. The skiing techniques used in a loppet include 'classic' (diagonal stride) or 'free' (skating). The 'Muskoka Loppet' is true to the original form of 'classic'.

In its early years, the 'Muskoka Loppet's' start area alternated yearly, at Deerhurst Resort and Hidden Valley or at the Port Sydney Community Center. Skiers worked their way across Mary Lake, over the hills towards Newholme and across Penn Lake using snowmobile trails to Deerhurst and Hidden Valley. It was one of the top loppet events in North America.

After a 5-year hiatus in the 90's, the Muskoka Loppet re-located to Arrowhead Provincial Park attracting a smaller number of participants without the World Loppet endorsement.

The Muskoka Loppet was held a few weeks ago, setting a new record with 373 participants. Part of the Cross Country Ontario Southern Ontario Paraffin Race Series, the distances were 5, 15 and 30 km which attracted racers from Ontario, including a large contingent of university racers, and from Calgary and Halifax. Even some former national skiers and Olympians participated this year.

The success is the result of the volunteers' organizing efforts and local businesses supporting the event.

BEST EVER FOR MUSAC - 40+ MEDALS

The recent success of Canadian swimmers at the Olympics displayed how exciting and rewarding swimming can be as a sport.

The Muskoka Aquatic Club (MUSAC) is a competitive swim club operating in Muskoka for over 40 years. With over 200 swimmers from all over Muskoka, training is in the Bracebridge and Huntsville pools. The club's goal is to provide high quality instruction and training programs to develop motivated swimmers and individuals. Most of our competitive swimmers are between the ages of 7 and 17, with programs offered for those at the start of their swimming career (5-6 years), up to Masters (19 + years).

In late November, MUSAC hosted a swim meet in Bracebridge, competing against clubs from Orangeville and Orillia. The highlight of the meet was an eliminator-style final for each 50m event for girls and boys. The top eight qualifiers in each of the four strokes; backstroke, breaststroke, butterfly, and freestyle, raced repeatedly, eliminating the swimmer with the slowest time in each race until one swimmer remained! Cash prizes were awarded for the top 3 placements. This unique style of racing provided both fun and incentive early on in the season while swimmers were gearing up towards the more competitive part of their season.

40 swimmers from MUSAC attended the Division II Team Championships in Brantford and placed 2nd out of 21 teams! This was a best ever finish for the club and a pleasant surprise for Head Coach Morgan Kierstead. The December meet saw our swimmers earn over 40 medals. Many personal best times were beaten and several achieved qualifying times for higher level swim meets later this season. The key to the club's success was the ability to field competitive relay teams due to a good balance of talent. Boys and girls 17&over medley relay teams each won gold and both boys and girls 10&under relay teams placed second, winning silver.

Swimming, though very much an individual sport, has a rewarding team component as well, giving athletes the best of both worlds!





Bantam AE's Ice The Devils In MPS








Girls Mark 40th Year


