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
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BANTAMS CARRY ON

We've heard of kids giving 'Overtime' to their grandparents because they're in it, meeting

Ron and Gerry (curling) and absorbing their sense of accomplishment, learning of Bennett our #1 fan, hearing the zeal in Mike Crawford's voice...maybe we're helping bring back the pride, passion and loyalty of the sports community.

We thank the organizations and individuals who had faith in us and the business owners who share our vision about the importance of sport in our towns.

We thank you, the reader, for picking us up every month...making us your #1 choice for sports magazines in South Muskoka...wait, we're the only one (little inside joke...ever notice all media is #1?).

If you could walk in our shoes you'd hear it. Then, you stroll away casually thinking, yep there's nothing going on.

\$47.5 MILLION - QUICK THOUGHTS

Before one thinks 'too much' or 'not enough', can we add some thoughts about what may be appropriate in a new arena/ recreation complex for Bracebridge. We're not architects or engineers. We did watch the webcast. We're fully aware this was a preliminary feasibility exercise to act as a starting point.

Though public input was invited in 2014, this magazine didn't

exist then, nor were we aware of it. This is a 'start', not the final plans. That means there's still time.

Included were the obvious - 1000 seat arena (single pad) and a modern library. There are other items that perhaps, since '14, should be looked at again.

Meeting rooms, banquet, lecture areas - between the Sportsplex, Rene M. Caisse Theatre, Rotary Centre, hotels/resorts, other businesses - we have enough. There seems to be plenty of time available at existing facilities where we may not need these. If we do, hotels can benefit by booking more.

The 'fieldhouse' is proposed as 'non turf'. Basically, a big gym offering tennis, pickleball, basketball and indoor soccer training. Pickleball's being played at the Sportsplex, basketball and soccer use school gyms. Soccer training on a gym floor, we assume, is relatively limited. Some soccer people go south for indoor turf. Councillor Mark Quemby suggested players could stay here while the facility could attract Huntsville, Orillia, etc. as the closest indoor facilities are in Alliston, Bradford and Sudbury. It was suggested a retractable hard floor could be put over turf, depending on cost. One reason for no turf, can't put on a car show. Do you want cars on this type of floor anyway? Could they use the arena floor? Could turf re-establish a touch football league, winter soccer leagues, ultimate frisbee, etc.

If it is built 'non-turfed', what happens if soccer and basketball stay with the schools, because of, say, cost? Who uses the 'fieldhouse'? Will turf guarantee soccer's usage of the facility? Technically, we assume, it does not...but it would help!

Do redundant meeting rooms, banquet/lecture areas become the gyms used for basketball, pickleball, tennis, etc?

We admit, as 'the sports magazine of South Muskoka', we don't know the actual size of each organization. However, we suggest the top 5 in no order are: hockey, minor ball, swimming, soccer and gymnastics. Three - ball, swimming, gymnastics - have modern facilities. Hockey will get theirs, shouldn't soccer?



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ERA OF SUCCESS ENDS – PERHAPS NEVER TO RETURN

It was remarkable that the modest population of Bracebridge in the learly 1900s could produce the extraordinarily talented athletes that made Bracebridge 'Canadian Champions' in field lacrosse.

Reference is made in Bracebridge History texts that there was a very active sports "association" in that era, perhaps providing good training, fitness and enthusiasm that made Bracebridge National Junior Lacrosse Champions in 1901, '06, '08 and '09. Those were the years they won the title. It is a matter of record that they were finalists in a number of the years between those victories. The fact that the





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g a m e s r e c e i v e d coverage in Toronto's newspaper, the "Telegram", gives credence to the fact it was a prestigious event and substantiates the local press in their extensive coverage, and declaration of Bracebridge as Canadian Champions.

As those players moved out of the junior age bracket, they didn't drop from sight. They went on to form the nucleus of a remarkable Intermediate Lacrosse squad that brought Bracebridge 'Ontario Intermediate' Championship titles each year from 1910 - '13, 1915 - 16 and twice more in 1919 - 20.

Lacrosse continued to be strong following those two decades of success, but the championships became more elusive. During the '20s and '30s local teams were active, suffering no doubt by tough economic times in the years of the Great Depression,

and finally faded into the background as hockey and baseball became the preferred local sports activity.

A brief revival of a local lacrosse organization took place in the mid-1970s under the guidance of Lacrosse Hall of Famer Bucko McDonald, but the arrival of the Toronto Blue Jays interfered and caught the attention of the community.



The golden era of Lacrosse in Bracebridge was gone, perhaps never to return.

The Royals then added another with six seconds remaining to beat the previously undefeated Mississauga team 4-2, earning the GOLD in a packed Newmarket arena.

Megan Cambruzzi led all U16B in scoring with 11 points followed by Kaitlyn Schofield with 10. Goalie Kirsten Schofield was third overall with a 2.0 GAA.

What made this accomplishment even more special, was that Muskoka iced only eight players and one goalie throughout the entire tournament!

As a result, the girls' earned promotion to the Central Soccer League, where they'll play teams from stronger soccer areas in the GTA. An exciting season for the team, and supporters, lie ahead!

Seeing that soccer is for all ages, the adult co-ed recreational and competitive team programs are back for an exciting season. Individual accolades for our players by the league continued. After Lucas Lahay received rookie honours in November and Schiller


September's Defenseman award, team Captain Carl Lyden from Karlstad, Sweden was awarded Forward of the Month for January.





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THE "WRIGHT" CALL - 30 Years Given To The Game

Of all the things that could have happened, of all the justifiable reasons to leave, a seemingly innocent mishap ended a long-time career. He was screamed at, scoffed at, questioned, surely blamed for playoff losses and, more than likely, had things thrown at him back in the day of demonstrable disrespect. But, that mishap last November in Bala dislocated his shoulder.

Now, after all that, at 69, Russ Wright - referee, coach, executive - has retired from hockey.

Wright's career began as an OMHA official in 1973 in Port Carling. He refereed in minor hockey until 1980 when he moved to the OHA, working his way to a 'Level 4' in order to do games up to Junior and Senior 'A' During that time, Wright and Don Stinson took over assigning officials to OMHA games throughout Muskoka.

Officiating all levels of OMHA All-Ontario Finals and travelling from North Bay to Woodbridge to Collingwood in "the O", in 1988 he took a break from the stripes.

Wright served on the Bracebridge Minor Hockey Executive from '85-'90 including two years as President and 4 years of coaching rep and house league. It was 'vacation time'!

For reasons only Russ knows, perhaps his ears needed another workout, he returned to ref OMHA in 2003.

"He would do any game, any level. He mentored



younger officials and advised us older refs," exclaimed Don Collison, Referee In Chief, Muskoka - Parry Sound Hockey League. "You saw his love of hockey before, during and after every game."

He gave a lot of time to hockey, to the kids who play...an honourable, unselfish man.

At the end of a note Russ sent to Collison, he said, "...thanks for your support these past 14 years." No Russ, the hockey community thanks YOU! Keep the skates sharp. **OT**



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VANKOUGHNET CUP – RAIN DIDN'T DAMPEN THE SPIRIT




